



Why do we have lanterns, Christmas trees and angels decorating our homes during these seasons of Advent and Christmas? They are symbols which convey inner meanings and Christian messages and if properly understood, they can be means for catechesis. Pope Francis in his apostolic letter in 2019, 'AdmirabileSignum', explained the meaning of the Christmas crèche. Setting up the Nativity scene in our homes and work places helps us relive the history of what took place in Bethlehem. It was St. Francis of Assisi who initiated the first Christmas scene and with the help of a friend, they created the greatest Christmas symbolwhich makes alive Christ's birth in Bethlehem. The original manger was full of hay, an ox and a donkey. The people present on that special night experienced a renewed joy seeing the poignant representation before them. Then, there were no statues; it was enacted by real people present and someone at the Mass had a vision of the Infant Jesus Himself lying down in the manger.

In our contemporary time, we place the statue of the Infant Jesus in the manger at Christmas time and the nativity scene comes alive. God appears as a child for us to take HIM into our arms. In the seeming weakness and frailty, God conceals His power that transforms all things.

In our frenzied life, contemplating the Child before us, we are drawn in silent prayer before the Son of God, born in a humble stableas we touch the poverty that God's Son assumed in the Incarnation. If we are focused enough, we somehow get connected with the Divine and feel the 'Emmanuel', God-with-us. All the characters in the scene, from the shepherds to the women carrying pitchers of water, to the musician and children at play, articulate ordinary holiness, the joy of doing mundane things in an extraordinary way, (Admirabile Signum, 2019) because Jesus is with us.

As we look back at our lives, we recognize the many blessings God has lavished upon us and to our loved ones. With grateful hearts, let us strive to be His presence in the world and allow others to experience that God really dwells among us by our words and actions gleaming with respectful, gratuitous, tender love in all our encounters especially towards the poor, reaching out to them with much compassion and care, (Fratelli Tutti, 2020). If this is so, then truly the 'Emmanuel' has come!

SANTA ROSA CANONICAL VISIT 2020: " **Embodied CHARITY** and VITALITY"

As a community, our hearts beat love and joy towards the recent Canonical Visit we had. Drawing on its acronym CV, this ecclesial event which took place last 07-11 October 2020 can be dubbed as an experience of an embodied Charity and Vitality. The gift of persons and encounters during these days have strikingly revealed the "tall order" of Christ Crucified's charity and were truly moments of grace. Likewise, it has highlighted the vitality of our charism as we have been challenged to live our consecrated life with the "more" that St. Magdalene is asking us. For these, we are grateful to God for Sr. Charito Balancin, FdCC who had journeyed with us for 5 days, sharing the gift of her person with each member of the community. On 6th of October, she was warmly welcomed by the Sisters present. After settling down & taking snacks, she then met the community for the Opening Liturgy and Conference. Subsequently, Sr. Chato began her individual dialogue with the Sisters.

At six in the morning of the next day, 8th of October, we had the Votive Mass of the Holy Spirit with Rev. Fr. Efren Montoya, Jr., the Youth Director of the Diocese of San Pablo. After breakfast, Sr. Chato, accompanied by two Junior Sisters, had been toured around the Campus and had an informal encounter with some of our teaching and non-teaching personnel working "on-site", since majority of the teachers are on a "work -from-home" set-up this school year.

On the 3rd and 4th day of the Canonical Visit, October 8 – 9, she had conferences (mostly online via Zoom) with some of our lay partners - "non-teaching staff, maintenance personnel, lay administrators and Lay Canossians". In between these encounters, she continued her individual dialogue with the Sisters.

We had a Holy Mass on the last day for Sr. Ma. Rizza Danao's renewal of vows. Sr. Chato then had a conference with the Juniors Sisters in the morning. Later, in the afternoon, we had the Canonical Visit's closing conference wherein sharing of insights,

> resolves and hopes took place.

> The following are some of the impressions and musings of the Sisters of the community on the Canonical Visit:

I found the encounter to be meaningful & significant. It brought a feeling of awe at how the Spirit has led the Community from the



- moment of preparing for this event until its actualization.
- I felt enlightened, challenged & grateful. It has helped me recapture the spirit of the Institute in the context of our current ministerial situation and made things clearer to us.
- My heart has been filled with gratitude for God's abiding presence especially during those days of communal preparation. In hindsight, I was able to revisit our community's journey in this time of pandemic. This process, in turn, challenged us to follow where the Spirit is leading us.
- I find the whole experience as cordial and warm. The sisterly affection and candidness made us share the truth of our person, of our current predicament in the ministry and of our hopes and resolves as a community. I also found it so nice to be able to laugh to my heart's content with my sisters.

Sr Chato's online encounter with the Lay partners

- It was life-giving & brought about timely renewal and affirmation as the community is still adapting with the challenges of the "new normal".
- I felt inspired and challenged all the more to live our calling creatively and courageously.
- "Lockdowns and quarantines" may have brought significant constraints to our physical movements but our sharing during this Canonical Visit generated some additional musings on how to carry on with our ministries of charity without jeopardizing our health in the process, especially in terms of being "cybermissionaries."
- It was good & enlightening. What I particularly liked was her emphasis that our true mission is the mission of Christ Crucified which hopefully will continue to lead us to a more mature and deeper form of prayer & union with God.
- I like Sr. Chato's recommendation on doing Vocation Promotion. She urged us to explore new and dynamic ways of sharing our Canossian Spirituality to the young. There is a need for us to interiorize & deepen on this. We don't need to be confined with the usual ideas or means. Hopefully, as we grow or journey onwards, we exude the face of Christ & not our faces.
- It affirmed very much my being an FdCC. I felt renewed within & also challenged to look once more into my own life with, for & in Jesus Christ. It gave me so much hope in the way I look at my "being and doing" now whatever task I'll do will have to be seen in terms of fulfilling God's mission in the Church & the Institute through the charism of our Mother Foundress.

- It was an enriching experience & there is a need to reflect on the points Sr. Chato suggested particularly, that of "building a culture of dialogue" among us - Sisters and with our lay partners especially those seeking for accompaniment. Also, as a school community, we need to look at the future with much hope and openness to what God wants. We need to ask this question: "What MORE is still being asked of us?"
- I felt positive about this visit. It was timely for our "journeying to Holiness in the new normal". This Canonical Visit is a sort of assess-
- ment, either guiding / affirming us if we are on the right track, or redirecting us if we aren't. Sr. Chato's presence encourages us to continue with what was started and animates us to be more open, creative and available to respond to what is being asked of us at this time.
- I felt very animated & came to appreciate more the gift of my vocation as a Canossian with the challenges that come with it, i.e., how "more" we can live with creative fidelity our vocation in the present time.

A JOURNEY TOWARDS THE **GOLDEN JUBILEE**



If a 50th anniversary is always a distinct and credible landmark in one's life.... a measureless sign of Providence, both of grace and other blessings from the ever-generous heart and hand of God, more so, for a Golden Jubilee of the founding of a parish such as San Pablo Apostol parish - Tondo. Indeed, completing 5 decades of existence and active ministry amidst countless challenges calls for the most solemn and joyful celebration of the Eucha-



rist!.... the highest form of worship through which we, people of God, can express our hearts' gratitude to the Almighty God.

Have a backward glance with me, and re-read the signs of the times in the fruitful life traversed by the San Pablo Apostol parish.

This parish is situated near the North Harbor or pier in the densely populated area of Tondo, in the periphery of Manila. It belongs to the first district of Manila and has more than 100,000 parishioners concentrated in about 30,000 square meters with 16 barangays divided into sorts of "colonies": Blocks of barangays, Happy Land, Temporary Housing, Helping Complex, Aroma, Tambakan, Lovers' Compound, Nepo, etc.

It has been for many years that the area across Road 10 has become a source of income for many scavengers, as well as for the children and adults who resided right at the foot of a mountain of garbage. At the beginning, the Sisters were also ministering to the people of Smoky Mountain.

There were the 2 small churches of Magville and Nepo and 4 smaller chapels that oftentimes were under water during the rainy season. A night of heavy rainfall then and now, can still cause muddy water to reach the foot of the slightly elevated altar of Magville. That time, narrow paths outside the church and all around the village were very muddy and full of holes during the rainy season. The poor dwellers attached their piece of shelter to the wall of the church in Magville. Another sect also built close to the wall beside it. The loud sounds from their microphone during worship was almost unbearable.

Although small with limited space, both churches in Magville and Nepo along Velasquez Street were filled to overflowing with people on Sundays, with many even staying on the roads just to be able to attend Mass.

It was in the year 1973-1974 when I first came to Tondo. Our pastoral community was composed of 4 sisters. M. Maria Fracasso was the Superior, with the three of us, me, Sr. Julia Untalan and Sr. Corazon Racelis. We were temporarily renting a small apartment owned by the Sembrano family. Our ministry was the clinic, assistance to the parish, especially in catechesis, and liturgical celebrations during feasts, solemnities and special occasions. We likewise contributed to the formation of various groups: parents and children preparing for the reception of the sacraments: Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation, Pre-Cana seminar, couples before their wedding. The sick were prepared to receive the last anointing. We joined the priest who celebrates the evening Mass thrice a week as scheduled in different blocks.

After a year, I was transferred to another community, but in 1998, I was sent back to Tondo and stayed until 2003. Aside from the pastoral apostolate in San Pablo Apostol Parish with the other sisters, that time, I was also to serve as Catechetical Coordinator in the Catechetical Ministry of the Archdiocese of Manila during the time of Cardinal Sin, DD. I was sent and assigned by Msgr. Gerry Santos as Coordinator for the formation of the catechists in the catechetical district of Kalookan. It was also at this time that I met Mateo Suarez, a volunteer catechist. He is another blessing to the Canossian Fathers' family. He is now a Canossian priest, assigned in New Manila as the Superior of the community there.

It gave me an opportunity to meet the Sisters both in the Philippines and Papua New Guinea via Zoom, the first time in the history of the Province that we celebrated Christmas together. It is a tremendous experience knowing that there are many Sisters who are praying for us in Formation and that it

enriched our relationship with one another. This experience had opened my eyes to see and accept the reality of global changes today. I feel very blessed and grateful to have the biggest support, a loving and joyful family in the Philippines – PNG Province.

Together, we are united in Christ and strengthened by the graces of the Holy Spirit to live God's love, joy, peace and hope to all we encounter in 2021.

Itzhak Perlman's story which I heard years ago made a greater impact to me now at this time of crisis. He was a well-applauded violinist and his story proves that something beautiful is in store for those who recognize and appreciate whatever one has.

In one of his concerts held at Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center in New York City in 1995, after starting to play the first few bars, one of the strings on his violin broke. Instead of asking for another violin or simply apologizing then getting out of the stage, "he waited a moment, closed his eyes and then signaled the conductor to begin again. The orchestra began, and he played from where he had left off. And he played with such passion and such power and such purity as they had never heard before." After such an

outstanding performance, he smiled, wiped the sweat from this brow, raised his bow to quiet us, and then he said, not boastfully, but in a quiet, pensive, reverent tone, "You know, sometimes it is the artist's task to find out how much music you can still make with what you have left." So, perhaps our task in this shaky, fast-changing, bewildering world in which we live is to make music, at first with all that we have, and then, when that is no longer possible, to make music with what we have left. (excerpt from his story)

This time of pandemic coupled with the many manmade and natural calamities is indeed a call to open our hearts, eyes and ears to the realities before us, to become creative, to make use of what is left for us and share.... We have witnessed our brothers' and sisters' magnanimity especially in times of crisis- not





just the material things given but the many gestures of love and solidarity through prayers, encouraging words, even sharing their place for the night or so and the like. The faith and trust of those who are adversely affected are shining examples and inspiration for us to find meaning in life.

The use of technology has been very useful in communicating with them and extending help to the various Dioceses of Isabela, Gumaca, Legaspi and Tuguegarao. Other simple helps were extended to out of school youth, the BJMP and gasoline boys, and people on the

streets. Buying food and stuff from the vendors near the Church and other local products have been more meaningful: not just to satisfy our taste but a way of helping them earn a living.

As a school community, there is so much loss, and here's to mention a few: the opportunity to meet the educative community face to face; the usual, "having gotten used to means" of imparting the lessons to the students, and the like. But we've got to make use of what remains! There are treasures that have been unearthened to continue on with the mission: the use of technology in a wider sense which really challenged especially the non-tech savvy or computer illiterates (can you imagine our 80-year old Sr. Lydia taking time to meet her students online?); the assistance of the lay people; the participation of the parents and guardians of the students and a lot more.

In all of these, the greater part of what always remains is the grace of God at work with those who trust and rely on Him, believing that He provides and completes what is lacking....

Many of our dreams came into realities in adding colors to the life of our suffering brothers and sisters.



GOD-IS-WITH-US AMIDST THE PANDEMIC

309 families were able to receive a parcel of food each: commodities prepared through the joint-effort of the Parish Council, the Sisters of the Oblates of Notre Dame, the Canossian Sisters, spearheaded by the Parish Priest of the Holy Name of Jesus Parish in Bomana, National Capital District, PNG. This was a way of letting them experience that God-iswith-us amidst difficult times brought about by the pandemic protocols. Some of the families who would intend to bring their garden produce for sale to the central market were barred at certain check points and were not allowed to enter the city districts nor delivery of dry goods to the villages were hardly possible sometimes. The parish has 12 community chapels, 7 of which benefited from the food provisions. The reality check survey of the

Holy Name of Jesus Community Association revealed that many of the parishioners were poor and in subsistence living conditions. The people had little money and did not know how to keep it for their future. People have not yet learned the value of readiness and preparation.

The Sisters attended to the distribution of the goods. The gathering was organized by the community leader of each designated chapel. The Parish Priest gave a short animation on the reason for sharing. We hope that we have allowed them to experience that God sees and provides our needs and will never abandon us.



- From OPD- out patients departments... Tele-medicine four times a week;
- For OPLAN Mahal: (Hypertension) There are 13 Sangguniang Kabataan
 (SK) who were trained to monitor the
 blood pressure of the patients per barangay;
- CBR- Community Based Rehabilitation and CHSC Hospice Palliative Care... we have now Tele-monitoring- consultation once a month;
- TB DOTS- we have monthly distribution of medicine by health workers per area and distribution of 5kilos of rice;

- CHSC-Community Family Medicine of San Beda Junior interns- we have Telemedicine with the doctors and patients;
- Mental Health Program- we have monthly injection for the patients and provision of free medicines for those who cannot afford to buy as well as distribution of 5 kilos of rice;
- Scholarship Program: CEAP-(SIKAP, ANCOP, St. Mary's College, SMSP) – We provided internet connection for their online classes in the in the Skills Center for the high school and college scholars who can't afford internet access at home for their on-line classes and researches since Oct. 2020. A sister and Lay staff monitor and help the parents with difficulty in reading and writing. There is distribution of 5 kilos of rice monthly for the 91 scholars.

Eleven new Android phones, 5 old phones and 1 tablet were given to the scholars most in need of the gadgets (donated by Phi Lambda Delta Sorority of UPCM); 5 desk top computer sets donated by San Beda College of Medicine. Additional 5 kilos of rice and school supplies for the 91 scholars during the Christmas gift-giving.

On-line retreat and recollection are given to those who asked for it.

This year's crisis has made us experience the Incarnation once again. The Incarnation, so dear to the heart of our Foundress is not a thing of the past but a continuing event-- right before our very eyes, this year, in our time and place. Jesus, the Emanuel, is in our midst, walking with each one of us, present in others especially in the poor that we serve.

"May Pandemic o Wala Tuloy Pa Rin Ang Pasko"



A significant number of families here in Calamba are living in poverty. The COVID 19 crisis and the series of typhoons in our country made the situation worse. How can we help the poor around us when what we can offer won't make a difference in their lives? The situation can be overwhelming but it should not keep us from doing what we can to help the poor. It should spur us into greater action. (Father Marcel Taillon)

The total lockdown because of the global Pandemic due to COVID 19 made us so helpless on how to reach out to the

poor to whom we are directly ministering in our apostolate. We have the families of our scholars living in different barangays and the community of Canossa Galva Ville. COVID 19 closes the door of our spontaneous generosity but God opens the window of mercy and compassion to the least and most vulnerable and this gives birth to active creativity.

Distribution of rice, groceries, dairy products and meat were given to the most affected poor families in the vicinity. On a regular basis, we gave hot pandesal to



different barangays. We named the project: #2pisomopandesalko. The school guard and maintenance, LGU's and barangay tanod, community driver, parents of our scholars and some good neighbors helped us distribute the pandesal. Financed by generous benefactors here and abroad, this project lasted for 3 months.

The many typhoons that hit the country recently forced the poor families living near the river banks to be relocated in public schools and barangay covered courts. Houses were underwater. They said it would last 3 months before the water would subside. More than 250 families were recipients of our modified "Bigay-Puso" this year. The distribution of goods was done in a very subdued manner observing protocol and physical distancing.

Recently, we visited the community of Canossa Galva Ville. The encounter was very casual but it gave us an opportunity to see the face of God in

them and to celebrate Jesus' birth with simple people. What made the encounter more significant is that, the gift they received did not come from us. It was the fruit of their labor in managing and patronizing their little store donated by Denso Autoparts 2 years ago.

The statistics of poverty in our country is heart-breaking as if the little we can do would never make a difference. But let us never underestimate whatever we are able to give, no matter how insignificant it may seem. We hope that our act of charity inspired by our Mo. Foundress, showing them our respect and expressing to them the assurance of our prayers, can help our poor brothers and sisters lift themselves up from their misery and help acknowledge their dignity as children of God.



One of our mission partners named Manuela Tungala is living in extreme poverty. Her husband is the sole breadwinner of the family who works as occasional construction worker earning Php300 a day, an amount which cannot suffice for their daily needs. Thus, most of the time they suffer from hunger. When they have money it goes directly for the payment of their debts. With this situation, it follows that other basic needs, such as educational supplies of the children, are not met. Even though they are studying in public schools, there are still

expenses to be paid. Both parents had limited education; thus they cannot help their children with the modules. Malnourished, the children find it hard to cope with their studies. Despite the limitations that they have, the children are really trying their best, and with the grace of God, little by little their studies improved.

The family is living in a house that is too small for a family of eight. Due to the limited space everyone suffers the inconveniences. The children usually have cough, colds and fever. Their condition

was aggravated by the COVID19 pandemic and the typhoons that badly hit our country. Their shanty which is already dilapidated, was badly affected. It is a blessing that the father knows how to fix it with the limited materials available.

Knowing the situation of the family really breaks my heart. It has been my prayer that one day their life might be improved. Thus, when Sr. Chato asked me to join the AMRSP Special Christmas activity entitled "Pasko ng Pag-asa" which would be granting the wishes of three consecrated persons for their chosen beneficiaries, I responded. I wrote a brief description of the case of Manuela together with a brief family profile.

As I sent to Sr.Chato the brief background of the family, I entrusted them to the maternal heart of Our Blessed Mother, asking her intercession that our wish for Manuela might be granted.

On the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, I felt great joy when I received the good news from Sr. Chato that our wish for Manuela to start a small business/carinderia was granted by the AMRSP. Indeed, I considered it a wonder-

ful gift obtained through the intercession of Our Blessed Mother who truly cares for the needs of her children especially the most in need.

I cannot explain the happiness that I felt, seeing them in tears as they received the gift of Jesus for them this coming Christmas.

Teaching our Christian Faith Today Challenging yet Consoling!

Our Education Ministry is an important venue for Evangelization. We continue to provide the students with a carefully-planned Religious Education Program in the Teachings and Traditions of the Catholic Faith. On the onset of this New Normal brought about by the COVID 19 pandemic, there were changes in the delivery of our Religious Instructions.

Teaching the Christian Faith this year is truly challenging but at the same time consoling. "Less is more" has become a "mantra" for many of us who are handling CLE and CS Classes starting from the preparation of Modules until the actual delivery of the lessons, we tried our best to be always guided by this principle "less is more" in addition to Department of Education's – Most Essential Learning Competencies or (MELC) which we also applied to CLE as the Most Essential – Doctrine – Morals and Worship.

The tasks of Online Distance Learning demands from the sisters especially those who belong to the generation of Baby Boomers to exert much effort in acquiring new skills in the use of various digital and social media platforms. However, on-line and modular modes of teaching are still offering us opportunities to continue teaching the faith. Despite this pandemic, we were also given the chance for a more personal communication between and among teachers and students

Furthermore, this year's community service activities on immersion and exposures program are to be done by the students from grades 4 to 12 with their

Committee on Religious Education

families at home prepared by the Committee Reach Out Program (CROP) will be initiated by the CLE teachers as part of the students' Performance task in their Christian Life Education subject, also in partnership with the Canossian Spirituality Sisters. Sr. Aurea De Vera, who is presently the chairperson of CROP, mentioned that since the outreach activities are realigned with the course description of the CLE per grade level, we are confident that the CLE teachers will be the ones to take care of the orientation/preparation phase, evaluation and processing as part of their lesson.

The Spiritual Enrichment Activities this year are limited to Monthly First Friday On-line Mass, on-line Recollections for Students from Grade 6 to Grade 12 and the Daily Prayer Assembly which is done either by class or by department. Special assembly prayers like: Mission /Rosary last October, Advent and Christmas (November – December) were also organized and facilitated by the CLE Teachers in collaboration with the Student Leader Council and the class advisers.

Our Confraternity for Christian Doctrine or Catechism Classes in Public Schools, considered as one of our direct contributions to the local Church's evangelizing activity, were temporarily stopped. First Communion and Confirmation rites of our students and the pupils whom we catechize were also suspended.

Moreover, part of our ministry of presence, the monthly BEC sessions that we used to have with our lay mission part-

ners, is also done on-line by Zoom. We continue to build and encourage friendly interactions and interpersonal relationship with our teachers, staff and maintenance personnel. All these are aimed at helping them to respond to the inspiration of a lively personal reflection and prayer.

Most of the Sisters are teaching Canossian Spirituality at all levels in the school. Some of them are engaged in the Catechetical activities of the local church such as formation of Catechists, collaboration in various programs, direct Catechetical instruction in some public schools.

However, some of us doing administrative functions, can only supervise limited activities concerning the teaching mini-

istry in our school due to our present situation. Mass gathering, and face to face encounters are not yet permitted.

At this point in time, with maximized efforts for what we can possibly do to accomplish the tasks we were given for this year, we keep in our hearts the burning zeal and commitment of making Jesus known and loved especially to our clientele.

St. Magdalene of Canossa, Foundress of the Canossian Sisters had these insights about schools:

"the school is one of the apostolic services that demands the most sacrifice,

but it is also the apostolate that brings about the most fruit"....

"Let Jesus be known and loved"...

Prepared, accustomed and steeped in the significance and relevance of Education for the integral Christian formation of our people, in particular, the children and the youth, the Sisters could not just close the gates and wait until the pandemic disappears, and safety comes back.

Yes, the Covid-19 pandemic stopped the normal rhythm of the educative community of Calamba. As a health protocol, mobility became very limited for the Sisters. They had to learn a new habit: precaution to avoid contracting/spreading the virus. Since March 2020, no students came to school for classes. Even lay teachers and Staff limited their coming to school. The lull from busy-ness, the restrictions in going out and gathering people, both the dangers and the uncertainty of the time made the Sisters focus on the primacy of God in their lives. They welcomed longer time for prayer and reflection where they cast their anchor in the Lord's love and presence. As they savored the Lord's closeness, the zeal for souls remain undiminished... even increased. There is deeper recognition about what's really essential in our life. And there is an acute awareness of many people negatively affected by the pandemic.



From limited resources, sharing was done for those around them. Although the regular face-to-encounters even with our beneficiaries in GalvaVille community was cancelled temporarily. Just 3 months after the Lockdown, the Sisters of Calamba were already cooperating with the 3 other Canossian schools in planning and formulating new means to make the teaching—learning interactions in Canossa Academy-Calamba continue effectively albeit new media platforms to be learned and mastered in so short a time.

As the Incarnate Word "grew up in grace and wisdom" as a Child in Nazareth showing humanity how to be human, and how to live, we all try to remember the Child-Christ in the person of the children and youth who braved the difficulties of the consequences of the pandemic to continue their schooling with us. Together with our lay mission partners, we also thank the parents who accompany their children on-line.

Princess and Josh are High school students while Jam & Venice are elementary students. Their home is just few meters away from my home.

The module provided is new to me so it took some time before I started. At first, it was really difficult since the family members are of different age levels unlike in a classroom. I strongly believe that this is God's work and I'm just His instrument. So, in my prayer I surrender everything to God and ask for guidance through the Holy Spirit

God was with us since after the first module the children became excited as to when will be the next schedule. It is done on weekdays but since blended learning classes started we do it on weekends. Family members are interactive since they keep on asking questions and respond quickly to questions about the Gospel read.

After a month, Josh & Princess already knew how to open the Bible and

In the curriculum delivery, we have utilized the Frontlearners Learning Management System for online distance learning (ODL)and printed materials for modular distance learning (MDL) where lessons, tests, activity sheets, videos are made available to our students. The use of zoom by the teachers during the lesson/daily discussions and the availability of IT personnel for assistance and the warm accommodation of teachers to students' needs are guaranteed to ensure learning. Regular communications are observed between the student and his/her adviser, subject teachers, guidance counselor through class group chats, emails, video and phone calls. We continue to strengthen our partnership with parents in educating and forming their children in this new mode of learning.

When it comes to extracurricular activity, Canossa-San Pablo continues to hone the potential of its students. Out of more than 100 applicants, Jedric Romero was chosen as one of the 20 ambassadors from around the country for the project SWAP (Sustainable Waste Action Program, a National Geographic young explorer's flagship project aiming to beat plastic pollution through upcycling. Tru-

The Foundress animatedly wrote: "You cannot imagine how much consoled I felt when I heard of the union of hearts, and peace abiding among you."



DOON PO SA AMIN... ONLY IN SAN PABLO APOSTOL PARISH-TONDO



On Dec. 17, 2016, I arrived in Tondo, my first pastoral community, accompanied by Sr. Glecy Manuyag, who commented that the time of Christmas festivities was a good time for adjusting to a new community. Indeed, that morning, there were many children and their parents ... It must be the Christmas party of the Daycare and Kinder pupils with their parents. There were other similar parties that followed: party for the T.B. patients, that of the complete Staff with volunteer health workers, then the Sisters and the stay-in Staff. But, Christmas Lunch was most memorable: it was held in the small parish hall in Magville where the Canossian Fathers resided. Present were Sisters Susan, Gie, Au, Dinnah and me; Frs. Carlo, Zaldy, Allan, Jordao and Rey; and almost 20 other Fathers and seminarians from New Manila and Marikina. What was unforgettable was not the special dishes prepared by the Fathers; not the 3 gallons of ice-cream brought by the sisters with a special dish. No! What was

striking for me was the presence of a family of scavengers. I have never been to a party like that! During the meal, only the mother and the 2 pre-teen daughters were seated on the one main table with some priests and sisters. The husband stayed on the street to guard their

cart. Mid-way lunch, the bigger daughter went down to exchange places with her father. It was that way for Easter, and the next Christmas and Easter when Fr. Carlo was parish priest.

Where else outside Sisters' chapels is the prayer to St. Magdalene and Mother Bakhita said? Yes, in the parish of San Pablo Apostol! Later, when September came, there was the Settenario and the reflections on the 7 Sorrows of Mary! On 2 parish Council meetings, there were suggestions to "deepen our knowledge about St. Magdalene of Canossa"! My first Feb. 8 Solemn Mass in Happy Land in honor of Bakhita made me feel proud to be a Canossian. About 15 small girls and boys, the choir, were singing and dancing with gusto, wearing white T-shirts screened with Bakhita's words:

"The best thing for us is not what we consider best, but what the Lord wants of us".

Going out after Mass, a procession was already promptly started by about 100 youth with blue T-shirts with the same words of Bakhita. Four young men had



the 80 cm. statue of Bakhita on their shoulders. I was teary-eyed with joy as I followed the procession.

If the Core Curriculum in the 4 schools is Religious Education/Formation, ask Fr.

Allan what ministry is the core in SPA parish: he'll pinpoint the Oratorio. For Fr. Rey? Charity and Sustainability. In June 2019, the community of the Canossian Fathers declared a "No arancel policy", when at that time, only one other parish in Makati does the same. Ask Fr. Rey what his encouragement of the people is: "Thank God for your blessings, and share!" During the first month of the Pandemic, there had been 2 fires: in Happy Land

victimizing thousands, and after about 3 weeks after, the fire with about a dozen families in Pritil. That time, the DSW gave breakfasts to all victims; the Fathers with the SSDM ministry, prepared lunch; the sisters, supper for 650 people during the first week and 450 people for 3 weeks thereafter, with Fr. Jonas and volunteers distributing for the Sisters and Staff who needed to cook the whole day for that 1 meal in the evening.

Before the March 15, 2020 Lockdown, there were Masses in the Sisters' convent on Fridays, Sept. 15 and Feb 8 with the patients. Then, they resorted to Masses online when from Mid-April to mid- May, when the Fathers and youth volunteers went door-to-door distributing Gift Certificates of P1.000, from a donor of Caritas-Manila. Then, there were distributions of packages in the depressed areas for the following months, together with sick calls and blessings. Dangerous! The Frs risked themselves as they did not just lock themselves in their new convent/church. The sisters asked them to resume rotation in going to the Sisters' weekday Masses only about this October. Six days a week, you hear interspersed in the homily... "for us Canossians"... "living our charism asks of us"...."the poor entrusted to us by our Foundress"... I am still in awe with the resonance from the sharing of brothers who look up to Magdalene as mother also.



The Dec. 14, 2020 "SPAP@50 Pasasalamat, Pag-ibig, Misyon Virtual Concert" is a substantial summary of 5 decades of slow but sure growth of the parish, born in 1970 with the visit of Pope Paul VI. The opening song of the mixed lay and religious choir was all praise and thanks to a loving God. The dialogue among a group of former youth in the 80's recalled the way Tondo area was, the first PIME and Columban Fathers, the coming of the Canossians, the activities and ministries they did as young people. The 2 Emcees, alumni of the oratorio, also made the audience recall how the parish was in their time. Chosen young FdCC Sisters sung a vocation song. Three Canossian Fathers sung an OPM song which implied their life with and for God. The Seminarians sung beautifully their praises. Other gifted singers among the youth also sung beautifully of goodness, life, love and hope made meaningful by the background of actual photos of parish activities of helping the poor in different occasions!



Children's Dreams... Amidst the Pandemic

"The Son of Man has come to search out and save what was lost." Luke 19:10

Tiktok dance, she loves it! Making moves to the left and to the right, she is graceful. Moving her hands from side to side, she looks nice. Shaking her head slowly, she stuns. Curling her lips, she has a remarkable smile. This girl is so sweet for a thirteen-year-old, she is also simple and innocent.

News came that the children in the community where she belongs to are complaining about her. She was getting the food of other children which they all received from their visitors. She hit one child with her long arms and another with her hands. Worst of all is when she pointed a knife to one of her companions and nearly wounded the latter's neck. Another incident was when she got angry with another companion; she pushed the table and turned it down, injuring two children. Almost all children were complaining about her and the harm she inflicted on them

How can a very sweet girl do that?

She is a wounded soul because as an infant she was given by her own mother to a friend since she did not know who her father was. The adopted mother was kind to her but the rest of her relatives living in the house made her a helper in the house. She said she would do all the household chores from washing the dishes to sweeping the floor to cleaning the bathroom and comfort room to feeding the dogs and whatever they wanted her to do. When she did not do what they asked from her, they physically punished her from spanking her feet to banging her head on the wall. Worst still was when one of them



put a hot iron on her left hand and it left a mark. Remembering that sad and painful day, she said a small towel was put on her mouth so that no one can hear her cry. She underwent a heavier ordeal when she was sexually assaulted by a man for many days who got her drunk first before molesting her. She was nine years old then. Just recently, she experienced again the same ordeal from another man who is the partner of her biological mother. She moved in with her biological mother two months ago because her adoptive mother died. After the incident, she escaped and hid in the house of her friends. It was the saddest story so far from all the children I encountered for the past five months. One is a ten-year old boy who was a victim of deceit by a father who murdered his mother. The father made the child believe that his mother died because she slipped on a banana peel while carrying a bucket of water seven days after giving birth to him. The other is a nine-year old boy who was a victim of physical and sexual abuse, engaged in smoking and drinking, and was exposed to drugs. Another one is a six-year old girl who was into begging and was caught by the DSWD people and brought to Manila Reception Youth Center. And the last is a six-year old boy who was beaten by

his own father and a concerned citizen saw and reported the incident to the policemen.

These children are now in temporary shelter in three different agencies amidst the difficulty of placing them there because of restrictions imposed by the government and private agencies due to the pandemic. They are provided with a safe shelter and a good environment, are now clothed properly and have healthy food in every meal. Their psychosocial needs are being attended to as well as their spiritual needs. They are also personally guided and assisted and protected particularly when they have a case to be filed in court.

So I am inspired to compose this prayer: Thank you Lord God, for the love you give to the children living in the streets. Thank you for letting your Son come, search and save them through this group of people whom you made as your in-

struments amidst the danger of the pandemic. Thank you for making me part of the team so that these children may be found and now placed in appropriate residences. Thank you also for giving me my Sisters in the Community who listened well and prayed much and even offered what they have like some financial help and goods in their desire to reach out to those children. I hope and pray for what is best for each of these children who have their own dreams: for the thirteen yearold girl who wishes to become a nurse to help the sick; for the ten-year old boy who wants to own a building with a restaurant, a chapel, a library and his own house; for the nineyear old boy who wants to become a soldier to help the people; for the six-year old girl who dream of becoming a police woman to help the people in DSWD; and the six-year old boy who simply wants to be become a bulldozer driver so that he can buy things for his mother and siblings. Most of all, thank You for allowing me to experience Your love

The Swiss Cheese Concept

Lately, in the ongoing conversation about how to defeat the coronavirus, experts have made reference to the "Swiss cheese model" of pandemic defense.

The metaphor is easy enough to grasp: Multiple layers of protection, imagined as cheese slices, block the spread of the new coronavirus, SARS-CoV-2, the virus that



causes Covid-19. No one layer is perfect; each has holes, and when the holes align, the risk of infection increases. But several layers combined — social distancing, plus masks, plus hand-washing, plus testing and tracing, plus ventilation, plus government messaging — significantly reduce the overall risk. Vaccination will add one more protective layer. "Pretty soon you've created an impenetrable barrier, and you really can quench the transmission of the virus," said Dr. Julie Gerberding.

"But it requires all of those things, not just one of those things," she added. "I think that's what our population is having trouble getting their head around. We want to believe that there is going to come this magic day when suddenly 300 million doses of vaccine will be available and we can go back to work and things will return to normal. That is absolutely not going to happen fast."

Rather, Dr. Gerberding said to expect to see "a gradual improvement in protection, first among the highest need groups, and then more gradually among the rest of us." Until vaccines are widely available and taken, she said, "we will need to continue masks and other common-sense measures to protect ourselves and others."


Bill Hanage, an epidemiologist at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health, retweeted an infographic rendering of the Swiss cheese model, noting that it included

"things that are personal *and* collective responsibility — note the 'misinformation mouse' busy eating new holes for the virus to pass through."

"One of the first principles of pandemic response is, or ought to be, clear and consistent messaging from trusted sources," Dr. Hanage said in an email. "Unfortunately the independence of established authorities has been called into question, and trust needs to be rebuilt as a matter of urgency." A catchy infographic is a powerful message, he said, but ultimately requires higher-level support.

The Swiss cheese concept originated with James T. Reason, a cognitive psychologist, now a professor emeritus at the University of Manchester, England, in his 1990 book, "Human Error." A succession of disasters — including the Challenger shuttle explosion, Bhopal and Chernobyl — motivated the concept, and it became known as the "Swiss cheese model of accidents," with the holes in the cheese slices representing errors that accumulate and lead to adverse events.



My Personal Panuluyan Experience (PPE)

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on our own understanding" (Proverbs 3:5)

This is the passage and prayer that became a guide and reminder for me to be strong, calm, and most of all, to trust the Father Almighty amid the struggle and difficulty that I have experienced when I gave birth last September 2020. I am still coping with it until now.

If I were to relive my experience of giving birth, I can say that it was like what happened to Mary and Joseph when they were looking for a place for the Savior Who was about to be born. Like Mary and Joseph, we experienced pleading, begging, and hoping that there would be a hospital that would accept us.

Unfortunately ,even the hospital where my Doctor is affiliated has turned down our request for admission. We were recommended to other hospitals, but due to their lack of incubators, we were also denied for the same reason. We have gone through more or less ten hospitals and had spent 4 hours searching before we could be finally admitted. This last hospital had also reservations before taking any patients in but they saw my urgent condition that the baby was about to come out. They had pity and immediately, I was ushered to the delivery room.

I can vividly recall that in that difficult agonizing moment, I really did not know where I drew out my strength. I



felt so discriminated while profusely bleeding. It was then when I remembered that many people were praying for me and that the grace of God was pouring on us..

If all the front-liners have their Personal Protective Equipment (PPE's) to protect themselves from the virus, I could say that for me, my protection was prayer.... the prayer whispered by my coworkers, my friends and families. Above all, my most effective shield was the gift of faith and grace from above..

I still could not fathom the meaning of the suffering and pain I have undergone. But I was strongly reminded by the words of the prophet Isaiah 55:8-9 "...For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither your ways my ways says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the Earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts."!

At times the ways and designs of the Lord are quite difficult to comprehend. At



times, there is an experience of pain. But holding on to Him, I had the solid assurance that He will never forsake us.

I also became convinced that entrusting myself and my family in God is essential, important and recommendable. To accept and believe in God's timing for everything does not depend on what I would like it to be. It has not easy to entrust everything to Him, but there's no other way except to let Him be a God and a Father to us and to allow Him to guide us in every step we make.

Lastly, as of now, though still in pain, I have high hope in my heart that all will be well. Thus, I say: "Lord, You are my light and my salvation; whom do I fear? You are my life's refuge; of whom am I afraid?" (Psalm 27:1 - 2): "Father, If you will take this cup from me; yet not my will, but yours be done." Luke 22:42.

THE DIVINE INCARNATE WORD ,GIVES HISTORY ITS MEANING AND VALUE



"When the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of a Woman". (Gal.4:4)

The fullness of time coincides with the mystery of the Incarnation: "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us". The Word who in the beginning was with God, and through whom everything which exist was made; the Word in whom was life, the life which was the light of men (John 1: 3),. The "little light " of Bethlehem, the light that illumines all those who are standing " in the shadow of death, is the first born of all creation" (Col.1:1).

It is in the fullness of time, that the eternal Word gives the magnificent MEANING and unique VALUE to the momentous event of History which took place in Bethlehem two thousand years ago., by accepting the condition of a creature.

Our faith teaches us that Christianity has its starting point in the Incarnation of the Word. This means that in the very beginning the Creator reveals Himself to a rational and free being as the God of the Covenant, of friendship and of joy. He is a God Who comes in person to speak to man Himself. He came not because man is seeking for God, but because God in his absolute righteousness speaks to man

Himself, and shows him the path by which He may be reached. Thus, the mystery of the Incarnation, according to revelation and to the faith of the Church, has salvific meaning..

St. Pope John Paul 11, in his first encyclical, Redemptor Hominis, reminded us that by the Incarnation of the Son of God, the Word of God becoming flesh and dwelling among us in the setting of history, has united himself with every human being elevating, human nature to an incomparable dignity.

Eventually, man is also subject to the moral norm which regulates the use of freedom. He is subject to the laws by w hich the Creator has established, the essential order of the world. Hence, the question: "Will man confirm the fundamental order of creation in his conduct and recognize the truth that he himself is created, - the truth of the dignity that belongs to him as the image of God, but also the truth of his creaturely limitation?"

The tree of the knowledge of good and evil recalls symbolically the



absolute limit which man, as a creature, must recognize and respect. Man depends on the Creator and is subject to the laws which the Creator established in the world, in the order of its existence. (Ordo Rerum) Unfortunately, Revelation tells us that through human disobedience, man failed the test.

"The woman saw how beautiful the tree was and how good its fruit would be to eat,

and she thought how good it is to be wise, so she took some of the fruit and ate it:

then she gave some to her husband and he also ate it. "(Gen.3;6)

Sin is the obscure reality diffused in the world created by God. It lies at the root of all the evil in man, and, one can also say, in what is created. It besets and alienates the human person. As a consequence of sin, the whole of creation groans in tears for the divine gift of redemption. The mystery of redemption then, is joined in the reality of man's sin and within the setting of history. (Catechesis on the creed, Pope John Paul 11-JESUS Son and Savior)

The "sad news" of the fallen man however, is set within the context of the truth of redemption. The Psalmist is right to declare that the "Salvation of the just" embraces the riches of the divine life that Christ has brought to humanity...He became man, "for us and for our salvation"

As the image of the invisible God, Christ is the perfect man who has restored to the children of Adam the divine likeness which has been deformed by sin. (2nd Vat Council) By virtue of our baptism, we believe that Christ Jesus, true God and true man, is the Lord of History, He is the "'Alpha and the Omega" (Rev. 1:8; 2-6) the beginning and the end. Jesus is the recapitulation of eve-



rything, (Eph 1:10) the fulfillment of all things in God and of his glory.

What an amazing mystery of grace!, Just as God in Christ speaks to humanity of himself, so in Christ all humanity and the whole creation speak of itself to God.

St. Irenaeus, convinced by the unsurpassable wisdom of God, and the unalterable dignity bestowed on man, freeing him from the bondage of sin exclaimed;" Man fully alive, is the epiphany of God's glory!

The psalmist too, in great awe before the grandeur of God acclaims: "what is mortal man that you be mindful of him, the son of man that you should care for him? Yet you have made him little less than the angels, you have crowned him with glory and honor." (Psalm 8)

The mystery of the Incarnation attests that God goes in search of man, to seek him out, because he is His special possession by virtue of a choice made in love. He loves him eternally in the Word and wishes to raise him in Christ to the dignity of an adopted son. (cf.Preparing for the Year 2000)

The three distinct parables of the" Lost Son, the Lost Sheep and the Lost

Coin" in the Gospel of Luke touch us to core of our being . In man's unworthiness, the Incarnate Son, Jesus , made us experience the gentle "owning", and hearing His triumpha nt and merciful words to man "you are mine"! You belong to me!"

Thus, In the divine person of the Incarnate Word, man in whom the Father's merciful plan of salvation was designed and accomplished, obtained his full realization and fulfillment.

In conclusion, we can say then, that the greatest meaning and value given to the history of all humankind, can be traced and seen through the transpar-

ent veil of TRUTH and of LOVE of the holy BABE in the manger, clothed with seeming fragility and uttered helplessness. It is like gazing at the first streaks of dawn shining so brightly upon the whole shadowed earth. God in His gentleness became one with the one loved... that was Incarnation. His coming in human time, is, in fact, eternity, indeed! May our journey towards the great event of our salvation, excellently planned by the unfathomable love of the Almighty Father through His Son, the Divine Word-made-Flesh" and the Holy Spirit, be full of hope, of peace, and exuberant joys. May it be a genuine realization, the spring time of our faith renewed marked by undefeated enthusiasm even in this time of extreme helplessness, that is challenged all the more by grief, anxieties, and unspeakable upheavals of the terrorizing monster of the and the almost unbearable pandemic, successive catastrophes ushered by the natural calamities.

My Spiritual Journey in the Midst of the Covid-19 Pandemic

My name is Novice Jessika Trieu and I am in the second year of Novitiate formation. I am half-Vietnamese and half Chinese living in Australia. Initially, I thought this Covid-19 was not so serious. I was hopeful that soon, this virus would come to pass and our lives will resume back to normal. One month passed, and another and till now, the dark tunnel is still long though flickers of light can be seen. The active cases continue to escalate rapidly throughout the world. This is really a moment to deepen my faith in view of last year's Provincial Project's theme on hoping against hope with Mary. I witnessed how praying in the community and the Eucharistic adoration have helped me to trust in God that He is listening to our prayers despite the increasing rate of infections. The weekly 12-hour Eucharistic adoration for an end to Covid-19 has united us as a community to pray in solidarity with the whole world especially with the family members of the sisters and mission partners who get infected.

As life on the world outside the Novitiate slowed down due to this virus, so did our Novitiate time schedule which enabled me to spend more time in prayers and reflective integration on new self-discoveries. The Lord is always at work in forming me whether it may be intellectually, human development or in our

Canossian spirituality and Charism. Our formator has doubled the Canonical lessons to help us deepen our understanding on the evangelical counsels. As she prepared my companions for their apostolic exposure, she enrolled me to study on-line a modular class on the Psalms. As weeks passed, I really thank God for speaking to me through the psalms; especially when He draws me to meditate on the Sunday's responsorial psalms.

But even before the pandemic, I am already thanking God every day for sending me to the Philippines for my Novitiate formation. It is a blessing and a *new cross* for me to experience living in a multi-cultural community with diverse personalities and temperaments which profoundly helped me discover more my true self. As I wrestle with these growths, I noticed that I was lacking in faith and kept doubting my self-worth of being called to this radical way of life of following the Lord. I began to imitate various personalities which I found attractive because they had characteristics that were lacking in me. Slowly, I began to lose myself. The Scriptures where Jacob wrestled with God in a dream gave me hope to persist in asking Jesus many questions of who am I and what does it mean to be here in Formation. Until the week when I studied Psalm 24, there was a revelation to grow beyond the effects of dependence on others especially in trying to keep the peace, avoiding confrontations, seeking for people's approval, affections and affirmation which I discovered were my strong needs.

Have you ever heard of the kroom bird? This bird is unique in a sense because when the sun rises, it turns into many colors. As I reflected on this psalm in the context of my current life, I realized at times I have become the *kroom*



bird by putting on other people's faces to the point that I cannot recognize who I am (my values, characters and ideas) anymore. That time when my intention was to "seek the face of God" in others, I failed to see the image of God and His gifts working within me. These moments are precious "like gold tested in fire" which helped me into an inward wrestling with God alone as I face my authentic self. This spiritual moments of conversion draw me closer to love, and to appreciate the essence and beauty of the psalms as the Lord let me encounter Him in biblical poetry especially when I see my life experiences resonate with the psalms.

Even though being in the Novitiate Formation is so challenging with many episodes of the Paschal mystery, it has helped me to be one with Christ Crucified as I undergo upside down changes in my life. For me, the best thing in the Novitiate is when the Scriptures come alive,

especially when I have done many mistakes in which I learned a lot, and experience God's merciful love through the Scriptures.

"Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." I thank God for the opportunity to discern religious life and to sense the presence of God in my formator. Here, I see patience, love, understanding, forgiveness, courage and the wisdom of God in action. She has given her best to form me according to God's will accompanied by her prayers for me. Truly, a woman who loves without measure. Jesus is truly alive and with me in my Formation journey and the psalms teach me to use them in praising God and trusting in Him every moment of my life. He assures me "I am with you always, until the end of the age".

Behind the Mask....

Damages and destruction of every sort, floods, and worst, deaths were seen in the aftermath of the typhoons Quinta, Rolly and Ulysses that created great havoes in different parts of the country particularly in Region V, Region IV, Region III and II in the last quarter of this year. I saw and heard this news in different media platforms and I was moved with much pity for the people who experienced it. Never did I think that I would be given the opportunity to see these realities.

December 18, 2020, I joined the Outreach Program of the sisters and novices of San Juan community in Brgy. Ibabang Yuni, one of the barangays in Mulanay, Quezon (Diocese of Gumaca) that had been greatly affected by the typhoons. While travelling going to the area, I had this little fear inside me because of the virus. As we went along, I became more scared, no more of the virus but of the broken roads we were passing by with many signposts that say: Warning: road depression ahead. It was drizzling when we got there. I cannot imagine the people living near the landslide, or near the shore with high and big waves and floods. I cannot imagine the pain of losing the little





possessions that they have: their houses, their source of living, and worst, the loss of their loved ones because of the typhoon. With these thoughts in my mind, I was expecting to see faces which reveal hardships, devastation and losses for they have all the reasons to feel that way, but I was wrong because behind their mask is a face of a person with faith, full of hope and gratitude. For they believe that God never leaves them, that each new morning is a new beginning, and that they are enough reason to be thankful and hopeful. They uttered grateful words to us as we handed them packed goods. Yes, their faces were covered even if there is no infection yet in their place, but their eyes revealed their faith that no matter what happens, there is a "rainbow after the rain". This short encounter with them filled me with awe and wonder at the ever-present God whose love for us is beyond measure, beyond understanding.

In this life full of uncertainties and broken roads, these people taught me to remain hopeful, grateful and see things in the light of faith. Before the day ended, all I can say was,

"Salamat po, Lord!" Thank You, Lord!

The Crib of the Word Made
FleshMERCY,
POVERTY
AND

Joy springs up spontaneously whenever I see the children of the poor rushing inside the parish church toward the direction of the beautiful and creatively prepared Belen. They are overwhelmed with joy and fascination as they behold the whole scene before them. What could they be saying to Jesus, I wonder!

The origin of the Christmas Crib? It is found in the details of Jesus' birth as related in the Gospel. The crib at the grotto of Bethlehem is the portrayal of the mystery of God's unconditional love revealed in poverty and simplicity. "Mary gave birth to her first-born Son and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there is no place for him in the inn". The nativity scene is like a living Gospel rising up from the pages of the Scripture.

Pope Francis, in his apostolic letter entitled "ADMIRABILI SIGNUM" highlights the importance of displaying a nativity scene in the home as well as in public places during Advent and the Christmas season. This apostolic letter was released during a visit to the site where St Francis created the first nativity scene.

How did St Francis invent the first Nativity Scene?

After visiting Bethlehem, Francis wanted to imitate the humble setting of Christ's birth. In 1221, St. Francis had a novel idea. To celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Poverello (the poor one) wanted to recreate the experience of the first Christmas. He did this, not with statues inside the Church, but with the animals in a humble hilltop grove. Francis' inspiration came after travelling to the Holy Land and seeing the exact site of Christ's birth. The sight of it all deeply moved Francis and became his particular focus that he wanted to celebrate on Christmas.

A Franciscan friar, Thomas Celano narrates the story.

.." about 15 days before the Nativity of our Lord, Francis said to a friend in Greccio, "I would make a memorial of that Child who was born in Bethlehem, and in some way behold with bodily eyes His infant hardship,; how He lay on a manger on the hay with the ox and the ass standing by." There Simplicity was honored, Poverty exalted, Humility commended;

...and of Greccio there was made as it were a new Bethlehem. The night was lit up as the day, and was delightful to men and beasts... " Francis stood before the manger, full of sighs, overcome with tenderness and filled with uttered consolation and wondrous joy.

Whenever it is and whatever form it takes, the Christmas Crib always speaks eloquently to us... the Son of the most High humbled Himself and became a "helpless" tender Child so that every family in the world may experience the living presence of "Emmanuel", God-with-us. Him alone is the giver of hope to the poor, outcast, abandoned and all those who are struggling defensively to face the harsh situations and challenges of life, regardless of their condition. (Francis l Dec. 2019)

Why was it then that the Christmas Crib can arouse not only such wonder and delight but even a sense of curiosity in all who pass by? Obviously, because the whole nativity scene declares the most extraordinary setting in the history of humankind. Indeed, an exemplary revelation of the rigid poverty against the shadow of superfluity, the unconditional image of mercy against a background of inflated inhumanity, and humility against the heightened contrast to pride and arrogance of those who aspire and believe that they themselves are god!

Amidst the noise and clutters of life, the lowly manger calls us to appreciate and value our dignity, who we are, of Whose image we bear, to be honestly grateful for all that we have received, without clamoring to have more that

what is necessary, and to claim stubbornly "MORE" EVEN OF WHAT BE-LONGS TO THE POOR.

In reality, the Christmas Crib is precious to us yet it demands a continuous process of passing on faith at every stage of lives to children and even to the coming generations. Our limited imagination can never, ever be able to grasp fully the interior divine message of the mystery of the Child in the stable... the pervading silence, the awesome atmosphere of peace, the tenderness of the holy family radiating the glorious triumph of the Prince of Peace.! Darkness is shattered for His Blessed coming can be likened to the first streaks of dawn on Mount Sinai... Like the morning dew resting over every blade of grass, giving abundant life and freshness to the immensity of the whole cosmos, partly covered by the dryness of ignorance, particularly, of those who are weary, and groping in the darkness of uncertainty, of hunger, nakedness' and death!.

The word of St Paul... "though He was rich made Himself poor for us" (cor.13:9) is a hearty invitation to trust HIM again and again for ... no one is left out from the great love of God"!

At this time of the pandemic, when the virus is still mortally invading the "global village", let us learn to listen attentively and to heed His call and contemplate the depth of the Father's will guided by a ray of light shining from the lowly stable. In prayer, may we hear His voice instructing us intimately to penetrate the meaning of the joyous event we are celebrating. He chose to come and be born amidst the poor in the humble stable clothed with great mercy and humility.
